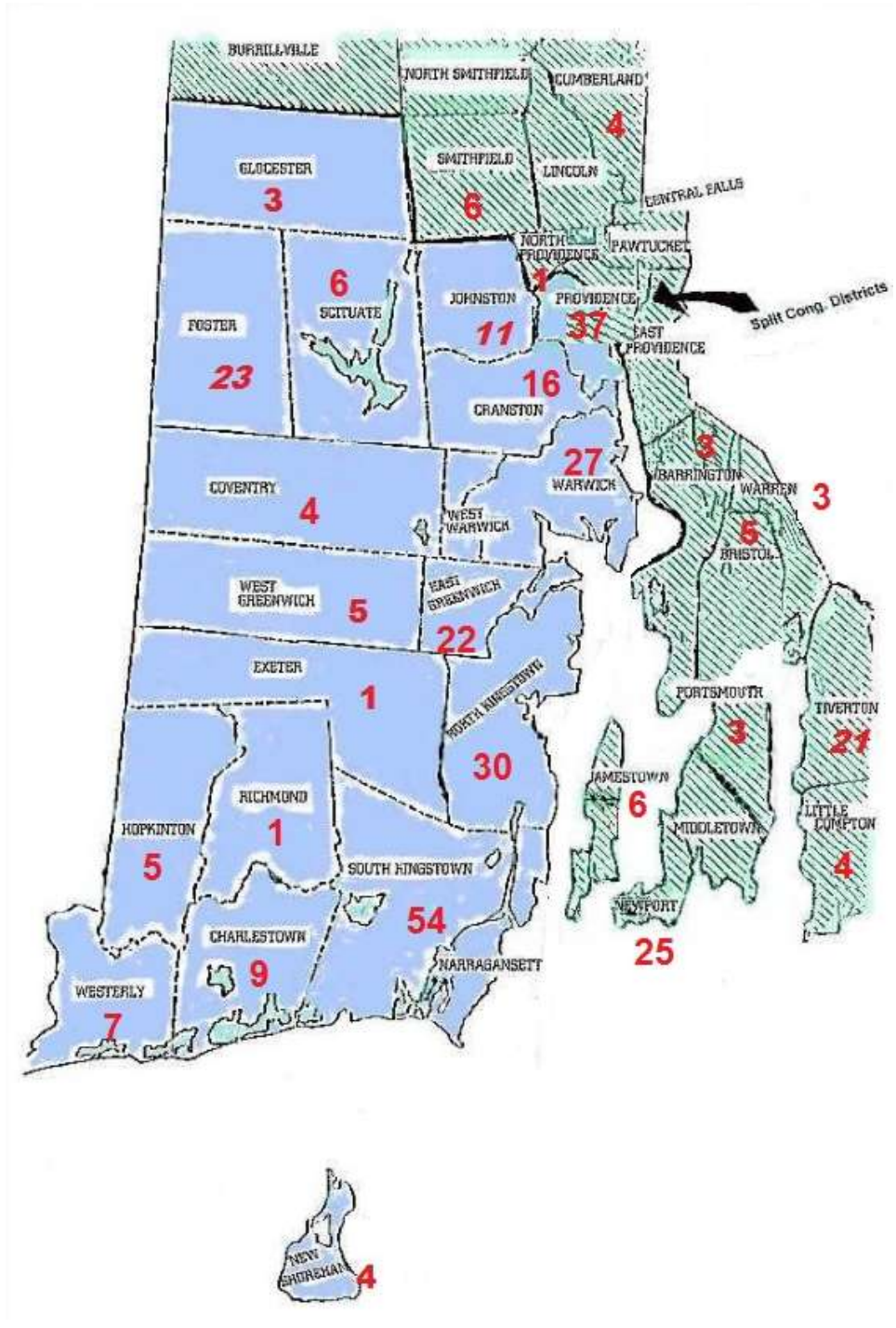

Facts about Rhode Island's African American Soldiers, Sailors and Patriots of the Revolutionary War



African Americans served in all of the major battles of the Revolutionary War (1775-1783), from Lexington and Concord to Yorktown.

Revised estimates suggest that between 10,000 or more could have served as soldiers, marines and civilian workers (referred to interchangeably as soldiers and patriots).

- For generations, historians had estimated that at least 5,000 served; however, less than half were known until 2008 when *Forgotten Patriots, African American and American Indian Patriots of the Revolutionary War* was published by the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) and put names to numbers.
- At least 783 patriots served in the Revolutionary War from Rhode Island.
- At least 272 patriots are connected by birth, enlistment, residence, marriage and death to multiple Rhode Island communities. 346 are traceable so far to 29 towns. (The map shows the number of patriot connections.)
- Almost 16 percent of the 5,000 known patriots resided in Rhode Island.
- About 64 percent or 3,174 of the 5,000 known soldiers and patriots resided in Rhode Island (783), **Massachusetts (1,570) and Connecticut (821)**.
- The U.S. Senate Energy Committee approved a bill in January 2012 for a citizen-funded National Liberty Memorial in Washington to honor them and the struggle for freedom of tens of thousands of others who sought liberty, including runaway slaves, civilian war laborers and freedom petitioners.
- The viability of S. 883 and a House companion, H.R. 2181, depends on the response of the Rhode Island delegation, since the state was central to the history.
- Members of Congress will look to Senators Reed and Whitehouse and Reps. Langevin and Cicilline among those who represent the 17 districts in Rhode Island, Massachusetts and Connecticut where 3,174 patriots once resided and whose descendants may still be found.
- 118 patriots are connected by birth, residence, enlistment, marriage and death to the 1st Congressional District (Rep. Langevin) and 228 to the 2nd (Rep. Cicilline). The two Senators speak for all 783.
- At least 17 Rhode Island patriots were born in Africa and carried on slave ships to the Americas. 9 of them were from Guinea.
- Communities are the patriots' closest and, likely, their most verifiable connections. They are their obvious voices. The actions sought to be honored are not about a race. They are about the nation's founding principles and our capacity to embrace them while acknowledging one another as one people.
- The descendants of at least two Rhode Island patriots at one time became members of the DAR.
- 29 of the 39 existing municipalities of Rhode Island are connected to one or more patriots. But all communities can claim every Rhode Island patriot as their own.
- Nearly 35 percent, or 272, of the 783 Rhode Island patriots, are associated with a community. At least 511 are yet to be discovered by a city or town. In Massachusetts and Connecticut, the known community connections are far higher at about 75 percent (1,174) and 70 percent (562), respectively.
- Descriptive lists record them as Negro, black, mulatto, mustee, yellow, colored, free, born Africa, part Indian, man of color, mixed descent, slave, and enslaved. Because of their light skin, some patriots may have been later identified in census records and on pension applications as "white."
- Most black patriots had typical European surnames; however, 10 used the surnames "Free" or "Freeman" to express their aspirations.
- The patriots had wives, children, heirs, marriages and funerals. These are the names of a few wives -- Abigail Larkin, Betsy Bent, Lucretia Thomas, Rhoda Irons, Delany Roberts, Phebe, and Marcy.
- Black patriots throughout the states served in many roles: soldier, sailor, marine, patriotic service, laborer, cobbler, cook's mate, waiter, barber, landsman, drummer, fifer, carpenter, servant, and gentleman soldier. (The majority listed in *Forgotten Patriots* were fighting men. All were placed in harm's way by their own decisions.)
- Sailors served on board the privateer *Rattlesnake*, *Lady* and *Joseph*; sloops *Providence*, *Independence*, *Fly* and *Success*; and brigantine *Resistance*, among others.
- Boys served on the brigantine *Famey* and on ships *Alfred* and *Trumbull*. At least three boys served aboard the *Columbus*. One served on a privateer.
- At least 17 of Rhode Island's black soldiers received pensions. Some list wives and children and other heirs.
- At least 91 Rhode Island soldiers and sailors died in service between 1776 and 1782.
- 12 communities in the 2nd Congressional District are connected** to 228 soldiers. South Kingstown (54) had the most. 118 are connected to 17 communities in the 1st with Providence (37), Newport (25) and Tiverton (21) having the highest numbers. (The Providence total is not split between the 1st and 2nd Congressional Districts.)
- Providence, at 37, ranks second behind South Kingstown (54). The totals of North Kingstown (30), Warwick (27), Newport (25), Foster (23), East Greenwich (22) and Tiverton (21) follow.

** Multiple patriots are connected to multiple towns. Listed above are 346 known connections of 272 patriots whose communities are known. For example, **Philo Phillips** was born and resided in North Kingstown. He enlisted in East Greenwich and also resided in Providence. He is included in the lists/totals of each community.
